The schools named career leaders is Ruth Norris, who also provides impartial information advice and guidance for students, she is supported by Helen Garner (Post 16 progression coordinator) and Duncan Smith (Deputy Headteacher).

Students are able to refer themselves for individual appointments, or may be referred by school staff. All students identified on the RONI list are supports by the Ansbury service and disadvantaged students are all seen during key transition points.

The school also works with the Careers and Enterprise Company and its Enterprise Advisor to deliver careers advice and guidance and allows providers of technical education access to the school to inform students regarding the progression routes they offer.
